Rule on "double dipping"

Double dipping between requirements is <u>not</u> permitted, i.e. a single course may not be counted towards multiple requirements. The one exception is a 3-credit language "Reading Knowledge" course, which may be counted as an elective or toward the minor, if applicable, because the language requirement is not based on credits, but rather on competency.

3-Year DMA Timeline

Below is a typical timeline for a 3-year Doctor of Musical Arts degree, consisting of two years of coursework followed by a final dissertation year. You may deviate from this timeline if you get ahead or behind in your coursework, but in principle you should follow this plan. Please note that enrollment during the summer terms is always possible, but not required.

Milestones in the Doctoral Degree

Doctoral Performance & Research Committee (DPRC)

To evaluate your progress and review your final research project, you will have a committee of faculty called the Doctoral Performance & Research Committee, which should be established during the 1st semester. Members of the DPRC will attend/listen to your recitals, provide input on your research project, and evaluate your progress at the Oral Prelim Exam and the Final Oral Defense. Doctoral Minor

All DMA students must complete a doctoral minor consisting of a minimum of **9 credits** of coursework outside your major area. Selection and approval of the minor coursework should be finalized no later than the end of the **3**rd semester. For detailed information about the minor requirements and registration process, see the <u>Doctoral Minor</u> <u>Registration Form</u>.

Preliminary Exams ("Prelims")

In your final semester of coursework (typically the **4**th semester), you will take "prelims," which consist of a Written Exam administered by your Major Professor followed by an Oral Exam with your entire committee. All major & minor coursework, including languages and any other special requirements for your degree, must be finished by the semester of prelims. You must have completed a total of **32 credits in residence** to be eligible for prelims. Additionally, in a 3-year plan (see above), if you wish to graduate at the end of year 3, you must complete a minimum of **45 total credits** before prelims.

Dissertator Status

After prelims, you will be in "Dissertator" status, also referred to as A.B.D. ("All But Dissertation"). While a Dissertator, continuous registration for exactly three credits per semester (Fall/Spring) is required. The default registration is 3 credits of MUSIC 999 (DMA Project/PhD Dissertation). At a minimum, enrollment must include 1 credit of MUSIC 999 and may include up to 2 credits of other research-related courses above 300-level (for example, a recital). Summer enrollment is optional and may be used in order to earn 3 additional credits before graduation, if needed.

Doctoral Project

While in Dissertator status, you will be working full-time on your final research project. Ideally, the project should be approved by your committee during the semester in which you take prelims (typically the **4**th semester), or at the latest one semester prior to the semester of your defense (during the **5**th semester, with your defense in the **6**th semester). For detailed information about the Project Proposal process, see the <u>Project</u> <u>Proposal Registration Form</u>.

Graduation

In your final semester of study (typically the **6**th semester), you must complete the research project and hold your Final Oral Defense. Any outstanding recitals must be completed before the defense. In order to be eligible for graduation, you must have completed a total of **51 graduate credits** (residence credits plus transfer credits).
